the world wars genocides and extremist ideologies of the 20th century are remembered very differently across central eastern and southeastern europe resulting sometimes in fierce memory disputes this book investigates the complexity and contention of the layers of memory of the troubled 20th century in the region written by an international group of scholars from a diversity of disciplines the chapters approach memory disputes in methodologically innovative ways studying representations and negotiations of disputed pasts in different media including monuments museum exhibitions individual and political discourse and electronic social media analyzing memory disputes in various local national and transnational contexts the chapters demonstrate the political power and social impact of painful and disputed memories the book brings new insights into current memory disputes in central eastern and southeastern europe it contributes to the

understanding of processes of memory transmission and negotiation across borders and cultures in europe emphasizing the interconnectedness of memory with emotions mediation and politics

this thoroughly revised second edition presents up to date analysis from various academic streams and disciplines that illuminate our understanding of employee voice from a range of different perspectives exploring the previously under represented paradigm of the organizational behaviour approach new chapters take account of a broader conceptualization of employee voice written by expert contributors this handbook explores the meaning and impact of employee voice for various stakeholders and considers the ways in which these actors engage with voice processes such as collective bargaining individual processes mutual gains task based voice and grievance procedures

this book makes the legal and political case for indigenous constitutional recognition through a constitutionally guaranteed first nations voice as advocated by the historic uluru statement from the heart it argues that a constitutional amendment to empower indigenous peoples with a fairer say in laws and policies made about them and their rights is both constitutionally congruent and politically achievable a first nations voice is deeply in keeping with the culture design and philosophy of australia s federal constitution as well as the long history of indigenous advocacy for greater empowerment and self determination in their affairs morris explores the historical political theoretical and international contexts underpinning the contemporary debate before delving into the constitutional detail to craft a compelling case for change

what is tragedy this work argues that it is at once art and science an absorbing art and precisely observed empirical inquiry into human psychology whose subject matter is the dilemma of manhood under democracy the author expands discussion of the idea of the tragic to include music drama in general and the operas of verdi in particular and explores the indispensable contribution of tragedy to an understanding of personal and political psychology through discussion of the political theory of structural injustice resting on the suppression of voice underlying evils like racism sexism and homophobia a developmental psychology of gender drawing on the work of carol gilligan the harvard project on women s psychology boy s development and the culture of manhood and an interpretation of tragic art including the expressive role of music in it exploration of the tragic impact of patriarchy on democratic voice is at the heart of the power and appeal of verdi s innovations in musical voice at its core is a complex psychic geography of patriarchal practices imposed on personal and political relationships parents to children siblings to one another and adult men and women such practices fundamental to the family politics and religion enforce demands by forms of physical and psychological violence directed by men and women at anyone who deviates from its demands verdi s tragic musical drama speaks of an emotional loss that literally cannot under patriarchy be spoken namely what the author calls the tragedy of patriarchy a divided psychology that lives in the tension between patriarchal practices and democratic principles and between the psychological demands of patriarchy and democratic manhood

in this pathbreaking work the author integrates questions of justice and stability through a model of deliberative democracy in the plural polity deliberative democracy and the plural polity provides a realistic but critical reform agenda that can animate struggles for justice in an enormously diverse world

in this work of historically informed political theory kimberly smith sets out to understand how nineteenth century americans answered the question of how the people should participate in politics did rational public debate the ideal that most democratic theorists now venerate transcend all other forms of political expression how and why did passion disappear from the ideology if not the practice of american democracy to answer these questions she focuses on the political culture of the urban north during the turbulent jacksonian age roughly 1830 50 when the shape and character of the democratic public were still fluid smith s method is to interpret in light of such popular discourse as newspapers and novels several key texts in nineteenth century american political thought frederick douglass s fourth of july speech and narrative angelina grimke s debate with catharine beecher frances wright s lectures and harriet beecher stowe s uncle tom s cabin such texts smith finds highlight many of the then current ideas about the extremes of political expression her readings support the conclusions that the value of rational argument itself was contested that the emergent enlightenment rationalism may have helped to sterilize political debate and that storytelling or testimony posed an important challenge to the norm of political rationality smith explores facets of the political culture in ways that make sense of traditions from whiggish resistance to protestant narrative testimony she helps us to understand such puzzles as the point of mob action and other ritualistic disruptions of the political process our simultaneous attraction to and suspicion of political debates and the appeal of stories by and about victims of injustice also found in her book are keen analyses of the antebellum press and the importance of oratory and public speaking smith shows that alternatives to reasoned deliberation like protest resistance and storytelling have a place in politics such alternatives underscore the positive role that interest passion compassion and even violence might play in the political life of america her book therefore is a cautionary analysis of how rationality came to dominate our thinking about politics and why its hegemony should concern us ultimately smith reminds the reader that democracy and reasoned public debate are not synonymous and that the linkage is not necessarily a good thing

detlef mühlberger s work hitler s voice the völkischer beobachter 1920 1933 is an important addition to the study of national socialism in today s scholarship it is difficult to locate a detailed work on national socialism that does not rely in some way on the völkischer beobachter it was truly the bullhorn of the party from the time when the national socialists were no more than a small group of unknowns gathering at the munich bürgerbräukeller until they gained power in 1933 considering the vast amount of literature on national socialism however it is surprising that until now there have only been shorter articles and two dissertations and not a single comprehensive analysis of the newspaper 1 mühlberger s translation of articles from the völkischer beobachter addresses this lacuna he has sifted through eleven years of the paper condensing them into two volumes his first volume gives a chronological account of the development and organization

of the party until 1933 while the shorter second volume entitled nazi ideology and propaganda examines topical issues such as attacks against the weimar republic racism and attempts by the party to garner support from workers farmers and the german mittelstand

the american democracy uses a narrative to weave together theory information and examples in order to bring out key facts and ideas in a way that should capture student interest and challenge them to think about the issues that affect the institutions and processes of government in the united states

with an emphasis on elections and their importance in our political system morris fiorina and paul peterson s groundbreaking text offers a stimulating analytical approach to american government that engages students as it gives them a unique understanding of their political system as it exists and functions today

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
